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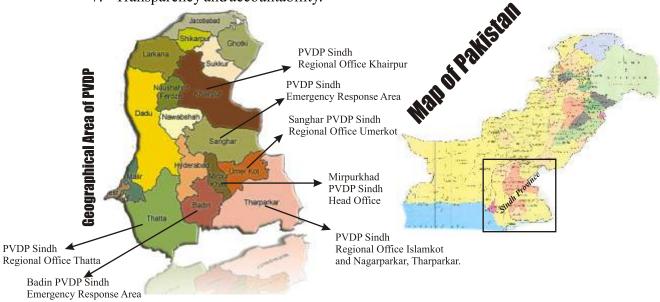

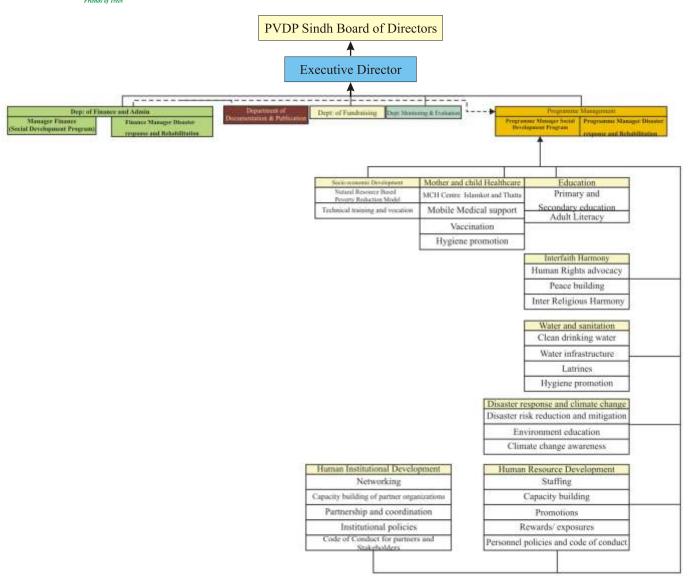

Executive Summary

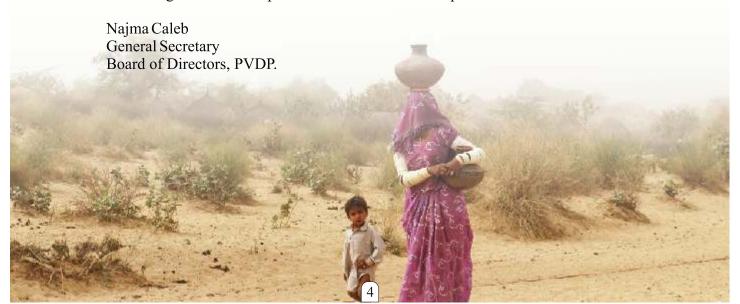
PVDP Sindh has come a long way in providing the necessary social and economic development services to the marginalized and ultra-poor communities of Sindh, Pakistan since its inception in 1997. The milestones proudly achieved include the Natural Resource Based Poverty Reduction Model (NRBPRM), time tested sustainable Primary Education Model, Livelihood Based Technical Skills Model, WASH and SHELTER models beside making the poor community aware on the social and economic issues and building their capacities to tackle them on self- help basis as much as possible.

Progress during the reporting period 2011-2012 include building livelihood base of about 700 marginalized households in Thar through Natural Resource Based Poverty Reduction Model (NRBPRM), provided access to clean drinking water to more than 16000 persons in Thar Desert through various projects, supported 2356 school children in Thatta, Gambat and Tharparkar to go schools on regular basis. Beside WASH, Vaccination as well as Mother and Child healthcare programs were carried out in Tharparkar, Thatta and Umerkot districts. Shelter project initiated in Thatta, Umerkot and Mirpurkhas districts helped more than 20,000 men, women and children in improving the quality of their lives after floods 2010 and 2011.

PVDP is a progressive organization and over the past three years it has substantially grown geographically as well as programmatically. The human and organizational capacities have been enhanced to take the future human development challenges in Sindh province of Pakistan.

PVDP sees itself become more efficient and effective in its work to deliver the expected outcomes of the human development challenges. For this purpose, it is looking forward to have a more vocal and effective governance and management structures, standards, policies and procedures in place from January 2013 and onward.

The organization is also looking forward to broaden its external support system in which it is planning on working with more humanitarian organizations to support more and more marginalized and deprived communities in Sindh province of Pakistan.





- 1. Poverty reduction and food security
- 1.1 **Project Title:** Natural Resource Based Poverty Reduction Model (NRBPRM) Supported By: Pakistan Italian Debt for Development Swap Agreement (PIDSA)

Project Description:

The support of Pak Italian Debt for Development Swap Agreement (PIDSA) is helping PVDP Sindh to establish a sustainable source of livelihood for people of Thar Desert. The project is contributing to empower about 2000 women who are the prime beneficiaries of the project. 1250 of these women will directly benefit from adult literacy and handicraft skill development contributing to their livelihood. The project is helping 3,000 school children who often drop out of schools during drought times, will continue with their schooling as parents will have settled livelihood due to this project. This way the children's right to education will be restored.

1.3 Project Title: Income, Shelter, and Health Recovery for Overlooked Minority Flood Survivors in Thatta District

This Project helps to reduce the poverty of the 200 minority families of District Thatta. These families were worse affected during floods 2010 and were left out from relief and recovery support. PVDP Sindh is working with them to improve/upgrade their life standard by providing livestock, shelters inputs and bio sand nadi water filters. Furthermore building their capacities by providing them community training and mobilizing them and making them aware of the importance of education and helping them to get their children enrolled in schools.

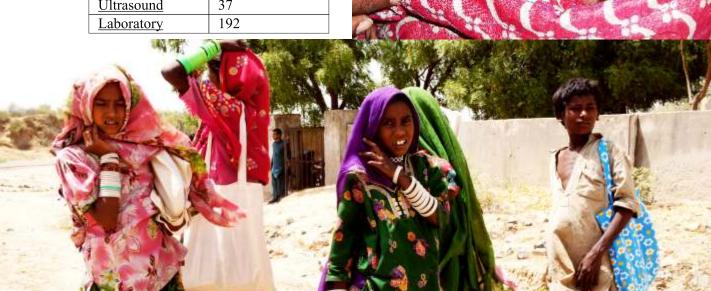
income generation activities. (Fetching water is the responsibility of women and every day woman spends three to four hours on this activity. When she will get water at her door step she will spend her saved time in handicrafts production for income generation. She will also have time to better look after her kids and livestock.

4.4 Maternal and child healthcare (MCH)

MCH centre of PVDP is serving communities at Taluka Islamkot of District Tharparkar Sindh. The centre is established to address the problem of reproductive health facing women and infants. PVDP Sindh is working to provide access to healthcare and educate people on proper hygiene and basic health practices to reduce the risk of infant and maternal mortality. PVDP Sindh also trains the local Traditional Birth Attendants (TBAs) from the project villages to enhance their capacities for safe deliveries and care of new born babies. The TBAs are also trained to visit women in pregnancy to provide antenatal and post natal care. Recognizing that the participation of women is critical to development, PVDP Sindh is working to ensure that women are healthy and strong so that they can contribute toward a better quality of life for

themselves and their children and families.

Tharparkar through its 10 primary schools in the remote areas of Nagarparkar in Thar Desert. More than 800 boys and girls who otherwise would be deprived of their basic right are receiving education.

1718 students are receiving informal education in 20 Child Friendly Space in Gambat, Khairpur district. Stationary has been provided regularly as per need of each CFS. It has been observed in the field that interest of the children is increasing towards getting education.
